## Maple Creek Centre

On October 28<sup>th</sup> the Maple Creek Centre held its first public event. The Centre is located on 5169 Highway 10, in New Germany. Originally, the building was built by the International Order of Odd Fellows, quietly aided by their wives and daughters (I am assuming) of the Rebecca Lodge.

The event was a dance with Tim Frauzel opening for the Mossman Road band, consisting of Ron Mossman and his nephews Jeff and Justin. Tim said that he knows of 30 bands that have expressed an interest in performing at the Centre. At \$10. per ticket, we listened and danced to a wide variety of songs that everyone could enjoy.

Over the decades, the Maple Creek Centre, as the IOOF hall, housed many

other useful things such as offices for lawyers and dentists. It was vacant when Tim Frauzel and Tabatha Clements purchased it in 2021.

They began to remove the evidence of former offices and expose the interior as it once was. Adding an up-to-code electrical system, fresh paint, fancy lighting, a refinished floor, 2 updated washrooms, a bar and a kitchen. Why, you can do pretty much anything there!

Tim and Tabatha have been gracious to everyone who showed an interest and are grateful to the many helping hands from this community.

Maple Creek Centre was the place to be on the evening of December 2<sup>nd</sup>. A lot of people enjoyed their Rock and Roll favourite hits. Performing for us were the "Usual Suspects" consisting of: Jody Miller, Tom Thomson, Tim Frauzel, John Noseworthy and Mike Freeman. Special guest was Robie Sager. The Usual Suspects have been playing around the Maritimes for over 25 years and "keep people grooving" with a variety of dance music. Folks could purchase a drink if they wanted and munchies are supplied by Tim and Tabatha. As usual, everybody had a great time.

On December 22nd, the Maple Creek Centre was open for another evening of dancing (or just listening). A variety of music, from Reggae to soft rock was performed by "the Essentials". This band consists of: Stuart Frank, Pat Wardell, Tim Frauzel, Delton Fraser and Nick Jeffery. Once again, Robie Sagar stood in as well. As always, live music is the best and the dance floor was always full.

The first event for 2024 was held on Heritage Day, February 19th when the Centre was open showcasing a slide show of old pictures of the New Germany area. Tabatha greeted everyone and said she and Tim want "a place where community can gather for events or just socialize".

Before the show started, MODL Councillor Cathy Moore presented a Certificate of Appreciation to Tim and Tabatha and Mayor Bolivar-Getson praised the efforts and goals to which the MCC aspires. As the slide show went on I could hear people commenting about other times and events they attended in the hall. Some people got up after and told their own personal stories as well. Tabatha, who grew up in New Germany, gave credit to her parents, Rose and Luther Tanner, for much of the history and photos.

Her goal is to produce a professional show that will be seen on YouTube. Looking to the future a hoped for event will be an Art Show this August. So all you



## Good Neighbours Make the Best Communities

We are very fortunate to have many beautiful lakes in our area. And even more fortunate when we are able to have access to them for swimming, boating, fishing or even landing a plane.

In New Germany, the LaHave River widens into what we know as New Germany Lake. From early spring till late fall, it is the site of much activity. Near the upper end of the lake there is a picnic park and boat launch which was developed over twenty years ago by a community-minded group and is now cared for by our local Lions Club. At the lower end, you'll often see people savouring the peace and quiet of a few hours of fishing near the shore.

But by far the busiest portion is near the centre. It wasn't always so. When my children were young in the 1980's, there was no access to the lake for swimming. However, through their concern for the good of the community and through the generous use of their own land, business and personal resources, Mervin and Eva Zinck changed that. Mervin and company cleared the bushes and rocks on the shore, hauled in tractor trailer loads of shale and sand, and put in a driveway and parking area. There was no public funding but there was some lengthy and not so pleasant negotiating with the Dept of Environment. Eventually, as Mervin said, "Finally they left me alone." In the first few years, he also provided a 10x12 foot raft with a diving board, provided a lifesaving ring, picnic tables and a trash can. Unfortunately, these eventually met with careless use and abuse and were removed. However, people now happily bring whatever they need, and the beach is very much appreciated.

When the 'flying bug' hit, Mervin, with Eva's help and support, built his own airplane. (That's another amazing story!) There needed to be a way to access the lake for taking off and landing. He along with his sons and friends had in previous years spent long hours clearing the lake of 'deadheads' i.e. logs that had submerged during the log drives, often with one end stuck in the mud and the free end standing up just under or above the surface – a tremendous hazard to boats or planes. I often watched them wrapping ropes or chains around the log and then pulling them out with a speed boat. Not as easy as it may sound.

With the lake safe for planes to take off and land, the next step was to build a hangar. And build they did. The well designed hangar became a place, not only for Mervin's plane, but a place for the 'flying community' to gather. For a number of years, Mervin and Eva hosted a 'Pilots' Picnic' on a Saturday in July when many planes flew in for the day and the community was invited to gather. Hundreds of people welcomed the invitation to watch the planes, enjoy the music, meet friends, and sample the free food provided by the Zincks. The most popular menu item offered was 'Merv's Ribbon Fries' – a special spiral-cut deep-fried potato treat! This was a 'trademark' item that Mervin had developed and which he and Eva provided as a Canada Day fundraiser for many years.

Always looking for ways to help the community, Mervin found one more way to improve things at the lake. The land at the foot of the lake is property owned by the Anglican Church, and when Mervin heard they'd appreciate having the bushes cut, he went at it. He cut bushes along a several hundred foot stretch of shoreline which has so greatly enhanced the view of the lake and the sunsets as we drive through our lovely village.

We are better because of generous and community minded citizens who go the extra mile to make our

community even better. Mervin and Eva Zinck are among many who have helped this community

become a great place to live. Sadly Mervin passed away earlier this year but the accounts of his generosity will live on in this area. I'm sure there are many more stories to be told.

Of the remaining 47.9%, 19.3% goes to administration, leaving 28.6% for other costs such as waste collection & disposal, recreation, economic development etc.

PVSC (property valuation service, covering the entire province) sets assessments based on the market value of homes. We continue to see homes selling at higher prices since


Covid and with inflation, setting new market values, which results in increased assessments.

It is hard to believe the year is already more than half way through. We have seen so much growth in our student body and frequently get compliments from visitors and substitutes to our building about how quiet our school is, and how friendly and helpful our students and staff are. I am proud to be the principal of a school that is so community oriented and in which our students, staff, families and community members work together to ensure we provide a safe and welcoming environment for all.



Some examples of the collaboration that have made NGRHS such a great place:

Our annual turkey dinner was a huge success due to all of our generous donors, the hard work of our O2 students, staff and volunteers from 143 Construction Engineering Flight. Everyone enjoyed a perfectly cooked turkey dinner free of charge.

Our wellness CLT group along with our leadership students organized an amazing activity afternoon on the day before the winter holidays. There were activities such as karaoke, dodge ball, cookie decorating, ornament making in our tech lab and learning centre and an escape room. It was such a success, the CLT group and leadership class will be organizing a similar event on March 8<sup>th</sup> for all of our students.

There has been some great work happening with our Jr. High boys this year by a few of our male staff. They are running "Guys Work" throughout the year with our grades 7, 8 and 9 students to discuss traditional masculinity norms and the impact they have on their and their peers' well-being.

There has been a huge outpouring of support from the community over the past several month as we

work together to ensure our students and families have access to the things that they need. We had reached out looking for gently used bras to distribute to our students and I excited to report that we have been able to rehome over 50 bras so far this year. Each time I have reached out to members of the community, I am pleasantly amazed at the support, kindness and compassion in New Germany. This was evident at the Community Coffee House we hosted in late January as a fundraiser to support local families in need. We had a full house, a great line up of performers (from those who have just started playing instruments, to far more experienced). Families and community donated baked goods. We had tea, coffee and hot chocolate and a whole lot of positive spirit! I look forward to being able to host another one later in the year.

Technology education at NGRHS has been in full swing this year with our Grade 10 Construction class building homes to scale right from laying/pouring a foundation with inlaid plumbing, to framing, shingling, and even landscaping. Our juniors have been building and racing wooden cars, building independent projects such as benches and shelves with great



precision. The new course we are offering this year is Energy, Power, Transportation and Trades. The students have been building remote controlled robotic devices and learning to build engines.

There are so many amazing things happening at the school with the support of the staff, families,

community and students it is hard to just highlight a few!




This cheese dish came from Mr. Minards' house and would have been used on their dinner table. Cheese dishes kept cheese from drying out.



## History of Hillcrest Masonic Lodge #93

The year was 1921; the village of New Germany was a thriving community, located between the towns of Bridgewater and Middleton, on the #10 highway. Its roots began in1803 when the first settlers, John Feindel and family arrived, followed shortly after by the Varner, Penney and Woodworth families.

What did New Germany look like? It had a railway station which served as the main cargo rail that had lines running between Lunenburg, Bridgewater, New Germany, Middleton, Bridgetown and a second line that ran from New Germany to Caledonia. It was the home of Zwicker's Pulp Mill, which was not only the largest employer of most of the village men and surrounding communities, but it also served as the main power source to the village and to the mill during its operational hours.

The community at this time had three churches (Anglican, Lutheran and United), a grist mill, a lumber mill, two blacksmith shops, one livery stable, two hotels, eight stores, two schools and one bank. This was all surrounded by homes and farms. The main source of transportation at this time was teams of horses and oxen. Moving from community to community was not easy and most households were independent and dependent on each other for survival.

The history of the Lodge says "It all started with three knocks". This was when Dr. C.E. Dexter, who was already a past master of Mechanics lodge, Caledonia, and at the time was practicing dentistry in New Germany, had the idea to start a lodge in New Germany so he went knocking on doors to see if other men would be interested in establishing a local lodge in the village of New Germany. Those men were E.D. Mailman, R.D. Lindsay, W.H. Cole, *Past District Deputy Grand Master*, D.J. Mailman, I.G. Grant, Henry Veinot, Joseph Smith, Syphorus Silver and E.G. Payne. After much discussion, these men signed the first petition to Grand Lodge. Each man contributed the sum of \$5 for that purpose.

Grand Lodge granted them Dispensation on January 7, 1921 – and Hillcrest Lodge was formed.

The first communication was held in what was known as Chesley Hall on January 21, 1921 with the following present:

Worshipful Master - C.E. Dexter; Senior Warden - E.W. Mailman; Junior Warden - R.D. Lindsay;

Secretary – E.J. Payne; Senior Deacon – W.H. Cole; Junior Deacon – D.J. Mailman; Tyler – Joseph Smith Others present: Syphorus Silver and Henry Veinot.

Some extractions from the first set of minutes state the Master spoke on the formation of the Lodge and what he hoped the members would be able to do for each other and for the Craft in general. It further stated that the brothers present worked on the 1st degree of masonry for the purpose of instruction, one of the brothers acted as the candidate. Two petitions were heard and an investigating committee was struck to review petitions for membership. The oldest member, W.H. "Bill" Cole, offered a speech. It was well received by the brethren present. There being no further business, the Lodge was closed in peace, love and harmony.

After this first meeting, regular monthly meetings were held without interruptions. Within the first year 10 brothers were raised. During this first year there was a motion passed that any doctors or clergy that joined the lodge would have their application fee refunded.

It was then in June 1921, Hillcrest received its Charter with the number 93.

**August 19th**, the first electric light bill was received; it was \$2.75. The Lodge had owed some back-rent to Mr. Simpson who owned the building and so it was decided to pay the back-rent of \$18. It was also decided that a committee to be struck to investigate the usage of the lower hall (now the Hillcrest Hall) for their meeting place. On the **18th of November 1921**, meeting it was announced that the first meeting of Hillcrest Lodge would be held in the lower hall and would be known as Hillcrest Masonic Lodge #93 Hall. It was obtained at \$15 a year and all the repairs that the lodge made to the building would go towards the rent.

The first official fundraiser for the lodge was held on **27th December 1921** when they held a turkey dinner and was served at \$1.50 per plate. It was then on **April 14, 1922** that Hillcrest Lodge adopted the first set of bylaws and was permitted by Grand Lodge to use them.

Hillcrest Lodge's first own Church Parade took place on Sunday, **June 25, 1922**. The service was held in "The Pines", a beautiful grove surrounded by tall pines in the middle of New Germany, on property owned by Isaac DeLong and usually and specially prepared for this service by the older of the Jacob Penney Seniors, a tradition that lasted for a good number of years. The minutes of a meeting in **1924** reflected a simple one line entry; "Postage of a letter is costing \$0.03"

**1927**: Electric candlesticks, locally made, were acquired and emblematic wands were bought for the Stewards and Deacons at \$6.00 per pair.

**April 29, 1942:** Master of the Lodge, Titus Zwicker, dies unexpectedly while in office. The history notes say he was just re-elected Master of Hillcrest and was buried with full Masonic Honours on May 1, 1942. It was then in **1949** when the treasurer at the time, made a motion that the dues be increased from \$2 a year to \$6 a year. Motion was passed.

The lodge continued to build membership and regularly held meetings where the degrees in masonry were taught and members were challenged and eventually raised to the Third Degree of masonry. Several years of the regular duties of Masons were achieved and the Lodge continued to thrive. By **1952** there were 48 Master Masons on the ledger books of Hillcrest Lodge.

**July 1952:** The minutes reflected that "one minute of silence shall be observed for the passing of King George VI, who was a Brother Mason" **1963:** All members and families enjoyed a picnic at Worshipful Brother Hiram J. Carver's cottage on an island in Lake Peter, everyone enjoyed boating.

**1971** The Lodge began preparations for its 50th anniversary:

There was a long list of committees appointed for the planning, which included many events throughout the year, such as a dance in January "that was well received and will be long remembered by those who attended. It was also a financial success." *In* March the lodge hosted a successful supper of ham and scallop potatoes.

Throughout these 50 years of Masonic activities, the notes and minutes reflected the many events such as parades, Holy Saint John's Day Services, banquets, fundraising projects and meetings that were successfully held by Hillcrest Masonic Lodge brethren. As well, many, many cash donations were made to assist with people in need and various community projects. One event of particular interest was a Garden Party that was to be held in the summer of **1949** to raise money for a film projector for the local theatre. The Masonic lodge was to participate by running games of Aunt Sally and Milk Bottles.

In **1971**, our own Hillcrest Member, Harald Weiland became the Grand Master of Masons for Nova Scotia and continued to serve this position into a second term in 1972. Harald had a passion for masonry and served as the Historian of this Lodge for many man years. His experience and knowledge of the Masonic history and its rituals were never to be challenged.

#### A passage from Wor. Bro. Harald R.K. Weiland, PGM, Historian

"In a community which completely changed in so many respects, where the educational, transportation and communications systems were profoundly affected, which works with cell phones, cable television, micro computers and digital cameras, where all that and much more changed in the course of only eighty years. Hillcrest Lodge No. 93 is still performing its basic functions as they were performed by those Brothers who petitioned for a Lodge eight decades ago."

The history of Hillcrest Masonic Lodge is rich and bountiful. The last decade of Hillcrest Lodge has been filled with activities such as the continuation of the annual banquets (except during the pandemic), Holy Saint John's Day services, regular and official visits with neighbouring lodges and fund-raising events. One in particular that was a raffle, again hosted by Wor. Bro. Hiram Carver at his cottage on the island, where a BBQ was held for the winners along with a flight in a light water-aircraft piloted by a local resident touring the area by air. Regular monthly meetings along with the financial support that is shown to so many individuals and organizations locally and in particular the Freemasons High School Bursary

each year; many projects that I won't attempt to name individually. Hillcrest Lodge, although today is smaller in numbers, continues its vibrancy within in the community, the responsibilities to its charter and loyalty to the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia. We can see how so much change has occurred over the past 50 years, 75 years and now 100 years. It is difficult to sum up 100 years of service to the Lodge and its communities, but I hope this brief but informative presentation provided a glimpse into the 100 years of service that Hillcrest Lodge and its brethren have created and given.
