



New Germany and Area Medical Centre Report

The Community Medical Centre in the village has undergone significant developments since its construction began in July 1993. The centre was established to address the healthcare needs of the community after the doctors had left. Now, 32 years later, the medical centre boasts a staff consisting of two doctors and two nurse practitioners, and a family practice nurse providing essential medical services to the community. Two admin staff support the medical team.

In addition to the medical staff, the centre offers a range of services, including foot care service and home care support, catering to the diverse needs of the community. Recently, the centre has expanded its staff with the addition of Nurse Practitioner - Lyndsey Gallant and Social Worker - Laura Pettes, further enhancing its capacity to provide more comprehensive care.

The Board of Directors plays a crucial role in overseeing the centre's operations. The current Board consists of Nancy Veinot (Chair), Thomas DeLong (Vice Chair), Courtney Jamieson (Secretary), and Deb Featherby (Treasurer), along with other valued members: Suzanne Kutach, Blaine Moffatt, Sharon Rutland, Laura Lee Seamone, Courtney Veinot, Sue Ward and David Zwicker. The Board continues to maintain the building, ensuring a conducive environment for patients and staff. Recent maintenance activities include painting the reception area and there are plans to upgrade the lighting.

The establishment and growth of the Community Medical Centre demonstrate the community's commitment to providing quality healthcare services to its residents. As noted in various reports, community-led healthcare initiatives have been instrumental in addressing healthcare disparities in rural areas.

Current Status and Future Plans

The centre's current staff and services are a testament to its ongoing efforts to meet the community's healthcare needs. With the recent additions to the staff, the centre is well-positioned to expand its services and improve patient outcomes. The Board's continued focus on maintaining the building ensures a comfortable and safe environment for patients.

Living in the Hills: with Fireflies

Do you remember the first time you saw a firefly? I was well into adulthood before a lightning bug flashed across my path. It was a warm summer evening and I was camping next to a shady grove in the Algonquin watershed. I was already curled up in my sleeping bag when the butter-yellow glow of a firefly appeared through the screen. As the darkness descended, the woods came alive with flickers of light. I felt like I had slipped back into the enchanted world I knew when I was six years old. That night, I fell asleep with a smile on my face.

Growing up in the suburbs, the neatly trimmed lawns of my neighbourhood were flooded by streetlights from dusk until dawn. Not a great habitat for fire-flies, it turns out. But here in the hills and valleys of Lunenburg County, fireflies

are in their element. They thrive in moist environments, making wetlands, shaded meadows and freshwater edges their home. "It's a disco at night!" I told my friends back in the city, the first summer I lived here. And it was. For a few weeks in June and July, the tree farm across the road lit up like a night club. The fireflies didn't seem to like my lawn as much as the long meadow grasses that grew between the Balsam firs next door. But one night, just as I was heading up to bed, a firefly landed on my window and began to flash its mating call. I was able to get up close and take a good look at its bioluminescent butt.

Bioluminescence is when living organisms create light in their bodies. Firefly light is released when luciferin is excited by a chemical reaction in the firefly's lantern organ. As that chemical reaction decays, it emits light. Fireflies aren't the only creatures who do this. In the ocean, some plankton, jellies, octopuses and fish also luminesce. On land, we see the glow in some fungi, worms and bacteria.

I was surprised when I learned that not all firefly species make light. In Nova Scotia we have at least two species that don't have the light-producing capacity of their flashier cousins.

According to the Xerces Firefly Atlas, there are six of flashing fireflies living species here in Nova Scotia, and 118 species across the US and Canada. Different species have different flash patterns, which males use to attract females. I don't know how many different species are living in the tree farm—the flashes all look the same to me-but female fireflies know what's out there. As long as it's dark enough, they can tell a 'Fairchild's predator' from a 'Double cousin' or a 'Murky flash-train.'

If you have fireflies on your property, there are a few things you can do to help them thrive. Let some of your grass grow long, avoid using pesticides, leave leaf litter on the ground and turn off exterior lights during those few weeks of mating season. These small things make a big difference. And don't forget, next time you see a firefly spark its magical glow on a summer evening, say hello! Their light has a way of sparking smiles. If you're still a kid at heart, why not stay up late, grab a mason jar and a butterfly net and catch a few for an up-close look at New Germany's finest disco dancers.



Connecting in our Communities - Pinehurst

On the 1st Saturday of each month – from September to June, upwards of 300 people gather at the Pinehurst Community Hall to socialize and enthusiastically consume up to 65 dozen DeLong eggs, 50 lbs each of Canadian bacon and sausage, hashbrowns, 40 loaves of white and whole wheat bread smothered in homemade strawberry jam, along with tea, coffee and juice. A crew of about two dozen longtime and newer community members, many of whom had been there the evening before setting up and prepping food, happily cook, serve, clean up and wash dishes to make this as enjoyable an event for workers as

for diners. The monthly breakfast is enjoyed by people from many communities as far away as Liverpool, Chester, East Dalhousie, the Valley. Families who live 'away', sometimes schedule their visits 'home' to coincide with the 1st Saturday so they can reconnect with friends at breakfast.

Construction on the hall began with the foundation laid in 1926. About 30

villagers of the day donated cash, labour, materials and use of their oxen and horse teams and worked together over the next few years until the hall was completed in 1929. The first pie sale and dance was held in April 1930 and this was followed by many enjoyable events and fundraisers. The community has gathered for square dances, card parties, yard sales, penny auctions, bingo, music shows, church events, breakfasts, dinners, suppers, wedding, anniversary and birthday reception and for many years, the annual school Christmas concert. It is also a place where the community gathers to offer support to families who face hardships and deaths in the family.

For all of these activities to be successful, it takes a village. With much work to be done, and many people with different ideas about how to do it, it takes lots of energy, leadership and hard work, but also a good measure of co-operation, understanding, humour, gratitude and good communication.

Many residents have worked tirelessly to host the events and over the years great efforts were put into renovations and improvements. A modern kitchen and washrooms, a new, accessible front entrance and heat pumps have been added. Most recently the hall has been equipped with a defibrillator. As Wendy Oickle, a member of the hall's executive says, "The hall is a building, but not just a building – it is a place where community happens!" Longtime residents and folks new to the Pinehurst area work together and encourage each other to make all this happen. If you're in the area and would like to get involved, drop into the breakfast and introduce yourself.

In July, the Pinehurst Community hall will host a CANADA DAY BREAKFAST, July 1st 7-10am

Currently, the only other public building in the community of Pinehurst where the community gathers is

the New West Pine United Church. They welcome people to services on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month at 11am for worship. It's a small welcoming group with a long and very interesting history. The Presbyterian Church was built at the lower end of the village in 1876 and in mid-summer 1916 when the water was low, the church was moved to its present location. Powered by horse and oxen, and guided by what must have been a group of courageous, wise and innovative men, the building was successfully moved across a road, river and railroad! In 1970, United Church congregations – <u>New</u> Canada, <u>West</u> Northfield, <u>Pine</u>hurst – combined to worship together as part of the New Germany Pastoral Charge and in 2013 they established the New West Pine Pastoral Charge.



There is much more to explore in the community's history. At the hall there's some history on display with interesting historical photos, such as pictures of the flood of '56, and community maps. You may still be able to find a copy of "Pinehurst, A LaHave River Valley Community (since 1872)" produced in 2014 by Ron Wile (and friends). Ron's mother, Elva Wile, was an avid scrapbooker and collected a multitude of articles from local papers relating to Pinehurst and surrounding area.

The first settlers, the Mossman, Knock, and Eisenhauer families, moved to Pinehurst (the Mossman Grant) from Kingsburg. A settlement was started and the community grew. Within about 40 years there was a cemetery, school, and church. The name was changed to Riversdale and then to Pinehurst.



The railroad came through in 1889. Trains pulled by big, black coal-fired steam engines carried iron ore from Nictaux to Lunenburg and other freight. There were two passenger trains daily travelling return from Bridgewater, one to Middleton and one to Caledonia.

A Post Office and General Store opened shortly after the railroad arrived. In the 40's Pinehurst had a Box Factory, a threshing mill and a shingle mill. From 1950 to 1999 Pinehurst had an Irving Service Station.

For about 30 years, in the area between the Community Hall and the LaHave River, there was a beautiful campground operated at first by the Maritime Religious Education Council (MREC) and then by the Canadian Girls in Training (CGIT). It offered a 'fine and effective youth program' for young girls and women aged 12-17 that combined instruction in practical life skills with fellowship and recreational activities'. Many from the community worked there seasonally and there was a much anticipated open house day for the community each year.


The camp was sold in 1962 to local residents and again in 1972 to a mill owner. In the summer of 1977, a crowd of thousands flocked to the Pinehurst Camp Grounds to hear a speech from former Prime Minister of Canada, the Rt Hon John G. Diefenbaker.

For a number of years (1947~1960) the Lunenburg County Federation of Agriculture held a well attended Farmers' Picnic near the bridge on Highway 10. There was a canteen and a stage built and hundreds of people came to enjoy Bingo, games of chance, a meal, music, square dancing and sometimes, boxing matches.

Pinehurst has been through many changes since it was first settled a little less than 200 years ago and continues to be a lovely community. Today there are descendants of those who settled here in the 1800's and many others who've made Pinehurst home more recently. Among these interesting residents, Pinehurst has been and/or is the home of a world renowned crafter of 'exquisite, handmade guitars', a country singer (who is singing in Newfoundland as I write) who held the #1 song in Canada in August 1972, a Canadian arm wrestling champ, a Russian Orthodox priest and others.

May I suggest you come out to enjoy breakfast, have a look at the pictures on the walls and ask a few questions about the history, the hidden gems and the welcoming people of this quiet community on the LaHave.
