

Battery Recycling Program

A new stewardship program has been introduced in Nova Scotia. Battery recycling keeps harmful chemicals out of the environment, prevents waste facility fires and ensures they are made into new batteries.

Accepted Products:

- A, AA, AAA, C, D and 9-volt batteries
- Button and coin batteries (used in hearing aids, watches, musical greeting cards)
- Rechargeable battery packs from power tools (under 5 kgs)
- E-bike and E-scooter batteries

Products Not Accepted:

Batteries over 5 kgs (including car and forklift batteries)



- Collect store in a glass or plastic container.
- Protect tape off the terminals of all lithium, rechargeable and alkaline batteries over 9V and all button/coin batteries.
- Deliver take to an approved drop off location (at least every 3 months to avoid corrosion). The waste site at 908 Mullock Road, Whynott's Settlement accepts batteries. Visit https:// recyclemybattery.ca/. Questions? Call (902) 543-2991. Batteries are no longer collected curbside.





Looking Back - The Newburne Hockey Team

A Newburne hockey team was organized during the winter of 1965-66. It became a part of the New Germany District Junior Suburban Hockey League. Teams in this league were New Germany, Watford, Springfield and Newburne. Games were played in the Bridgewater Arena on Monday nights. Gary Langille coached for two years, Warren Veinotte for the third year, then George N. Jodrey.

Goalie was Terry Dorey. Other team members were: Ray Veinot, Richard Veinot, Warren Veinotte, Harry Veinotte, Lloyd Jodrey, Lorraine Naas, Lennis Corkum, Emery Wentzell, Alan Foster, Bobby Dorey, Calvin Wentzell, Jack Wentzell, Vernon Wentzell, Carter Mader and Avard Mader as a spare.

Team members bought their own white sweaters and put black numbers on them. They bought their own equipment. Each player paid \$2 a game to play and each car driver received \$2 for gas. They paid to practice in the Bridgewater rink on Sunday mornings. Other practice sessions were held on a cove of the Trouthole.

A cup was donated. Newburne lost to New Germany in the finals that first year. They won it in 1973-74 and again in 1974-75.

The league games were popular and crowds were good.

Later teams acquired sponsors and Robert Hirtle sponsored Newburne. The team uniforms, first white with black numbers, then white and blue changed to solid blue.

The following is taken from an issue of the Bridgewater Bulletin in 1972:


"The Newburne Flyers lived up to their name in the final match of this semi-final series. The opponents, the "Springfield Ice Kings" did not. The final score was Newburne – 7, Springfield – 0. Newburne will now meet "Wynn's Jets" of New Germany in the 3 out of 5 finals.

"The Newburne team came out skating. Before the game was 4 minutes old they had their first goal. They scored another before the initial period ended. The second period was scoreless.

The Flyers put the game away with two goals in the first five minutes of the third period. But even then they did not stop skating. Carter Mader scored 2 goals. His brother and linemate, Avard Mader had 1 goal and 2 assists. The other Newburne goals were scored by Brady Spidle, Gary Veino, Bradley Nickerson and Merle Deal.

In 1971-72, Peter Silver and Gary Veino scored 17 goals apiece. Lorraine Nass of Newburne was again the League's "Bad Man" with 22 minutes in the penalty box, a far cry from his record 66 minutes in 1969 – 70."

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Living in the Hills: Drumlins

The first time I drove through the New Germany area, there was a light snow falling. I took the Northfield road up from Blockhouse on my way to look at a house for sale. But before I even saw the house I fell in love with the rolling hills, the wooden bridge over Patten Brook and the old grey barn on the shore of Sucker Lake. Everything was covered in that fresh white snow of new beginnings. I was sold.

My first summer living here, friends in the city would ask, "What's it like in New Germany?" And I'd answer, "Most of my neighbours are cows," which is true. But behind the joking reference to the herd of Charolais cattle I greeted each morning on my walk was my dawning realization that I am just a very small part of the community of creatures that graze and burrow, hunt and pollinate in these hills. There's simply a lot of life here.

Geologically speaking, the hills themselves have a kind of life too—and I don't just mean the crawlies, mycelium and microbes in the soil. The hills of our area were born under the ice of the last glacier, and they continue to morph and grow as waterways like Ross Brook, Indian Brook and the LaHave River carve the valleys between them. They even have a name: drumlins. From above, drumlins look like whales breaching or a collection of half-buried eggs. They are oblong, and occur in parallels or fan-like formations called fields or swarms. This past February, as the four-inch ice sheet covering my driveway finally began to thaw and drain, my own mini-drumlins appeared as lumps of sand between grooves of meltwater.


Three years have passed since that snowy day when I drove up Northfield Road for the first time. Three spring thaws, three Christmas tree harvests, three migrations of Canada geese. In that time, I've begun to meet my neighbours, and to learn their names: Barred Owl, Lichenmarked Orbweaver, White Pine, Bobolink, Chicken of the Woods. I've met many wonderful human neighbours, too, but in this new column for New Germany Connections, I'm going to introduce you to a few of the living plants, animals,

insects and fungi that share these hills with us. Together we'll dip into the lives of fireflies, black bears, crabapple trees, or whatever catches my eye.

What's living in the hills around your house? Say hello to them for me!

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HOME SWEET HOME at the Hummingbird Café

Even though their Facebook post said the Hummingbird Café would be closed, the sign in the window was turned to closed and potential customers were turned away at the door, things were definitely 'humming' inside the Hummingbird Café in New Germany on Wednesday, February 26th.

Just before 10am the team from Winter Light Productions, directed by Paul Kimball, based in Dartmouth began to arrive. Co-Directors Joe Ciarrocco and Brandon Cadman were here with their technical team and their host, Amy Murphy, to film an episode of Home Sweet Home, a series produced for Eastlink TV.

The Home Sweet Home series, which started 3 years ago, began with visiting and highlighting local bakeries and then moved to local restaurants in the Maritimes, mainly in Nova Scotia. Joe explained that they'd done programs at a number of eating establishments in Lunenburg and Mahone Bay and when he learned about the Hummingbird Café he contacted Jay Robar. The visit to New Germany was arranged. Excitement was building!

Lights and cameras were first set up for an interview with Amy and Jay at one of the Café tables. With her engaging questions, Amy brought out the story of how Jay loved to cook and bake from a very young age; how she helped out with dinners and breakfasts at the Anglican Church Hall as soon as she was old enough, including at their July 1st breakfasts and at their long running annual Dinner Theatre. She spoke about her first job at DeLong's Restaurant and then at the Turkeyburger; about her Culinary Arts Program at NSCC Bridgewater Campus and subsequent work at the Grand Banker and Mateus Bistro. She explained that her years working at a large Sobeys Bakery in Halifax strengthened her desire to come back home to live and work in New Germany. Her first step, in 2020, was to purchase the house next to New Germany Plumbing and Heating with a secret hope that she might eventually acquire that building. With help and guidance from



some excellent local contractors, her brother, Tim, and friends, the house was renovated.

Amy listened with great interest as Jay talked about the great community spirit in New Germany and explained that The Hummingbird Café began as part of the summer New Germany Farmers Market at St John's Anglican Church Hall in the spring of 2023, and then continued to operate through the winter on Fridays. The current building was purchased in the fall of 2023, renovations continued through the winter and spring (again with Tim, friends, architects, engineers, contractors and excellent community support), and the Café was packed within an hour of opening for breakfast on June 29, 2024. The community has been enthusiastic about the historic 'Mrs. Oickle's Store' being restored and it has become, not only a great place to eat, but also a very friendly and popular gathering spot.

After the initial interview, the cameras and lights were moved as the cooking was about to begin. Amy moved to the kitchen for a conversation with Tim, Jay's brother and the Café's main man on the grill and fryers. As they talked, Tim told Amy that he had learned to cook breakfast at home with his grandfather's

guidance, but that cooking as a career actually started on June 29th. He, too, had worked a bit at the Turkeyburger and Grand Banker, but mostly in the dish pit and doing some prep on the line. He skillfully explained and demonstrated how to cook the bacon just right and not overcook the sausage, what temperature is just right for the eggs, how to time the fryers to cook the hash browns and fries to perfection. He spoke with good-natured humour about the challenge of working with his sister and being 'voluntold' from time to time as the Café turned from a dream to reality. Amy kept the questions flowing and expressed her delight as the '644 Breakfast' took shape!



The lights and cameras moved to a different angle in the kitchen to film the final plating of the '644 Breakfast' and the 'Rustic Benny". There was conversation about eggs from DeLong's, maple syrup from Maplewood, Grandma's homemade baked beans, Valley sourced chicken, bacon and sausage, local microgreens as Jay added the finishing touches to these delicious breakfast plates under Amy's watchful eye. The next moves were to film Jay preparing the very popular chicken club sandwich and the cranberry goat cheese panini. Here Amy was 'put to work' adding sauces and veggies as she questioned every detail.

The film crew were taking close-up shots of the toast entering and leaving the toaster, a shot of the bean pot, multiple shots of the homemade cakes, cheesecakes, éclairs, coconut cream pies, scones, cinnamon rolls. The camera men zeroed in on the historic photos of Mrs. Oickle who operated the original Dry Goods Store for so many years, on some of the hummingbird art and displays, on a latte being made and, of course, shots of the outside of the building.

The final portion filmed for Home Sweet Home was at the Café table where Jay and Amy had had their first conversation. Now Amy was trying each of the foods that had been prepared. Her enthusiasm and enjoyment of each of the foods was evident. This was a delight to Jay and Tim who had begun the day a bit nervous about what might be expected and how this filming might go, but who ended the day feeling like they'd spent a day with new friends.

At every break in filming, and after the filming when the crew were generously fed with their choices from the menu, there were friendly conversations with the crew. We learned that the co-directors were both grads of the relatively new NSCC Screen Arts program at the Ivany Campus. The two camera men were not just

brothers, but two of three triplet brothers, and their sister, Emily, was the production assistant. And in small world coincidences, Amy had played the camp counselor's daughter on the 2005 movie, Summerhood, filmed at Camp Kadimah, where Jay, as a Jr High student, was an extra and Amy's friend,

Thyra, was in Jay's grandmother's primary class at New Germany Elementary. The crew left with hugs and promises that they'd be back to visit.

Where and when can you watch this episode? It will be part of Season Five and expected to be shown on Eastlink TV next winter. We'll post it on The Hummingbird Café Facebook as soon as we know.

Greetings from Rosedale Home for Special Care. We are a long-term care facility located in the heart of New Germany and home to 39 amazing residents and over 80 incredible staff.

We would like to thank all community members who have supported our fundraising efforts for the bus fund. Our bus holds 12 people. We can take up to 4 wheelchairs and 8 seated residents and staff (including our driver). We upgraded from a mini van in 2019 and haven't look back. The bus is not government funded; we rely purely on community donations to keep it running. The purchase price was well over \$100,000 and currently it costs close to \$250 just to fill the tank. You can imagine how costly this can be. We are grateful for the donations we have received this holiday season, including \$1,000 from the Lions club, \$1,000 from the Barss Corner Baptist Ladies, \$1,000 from Buck's Home Building Centre. We have also received close to \$2,000 in donations from community members and families. We are amazed and so proud of the generosity our community has shown and our residents appreciate it. We see some of our biggest smiles out and about in the community.

We would also like to thank the New Germany Volunteer Fire Department for the donation of \$800 toward our new fire-retardant curtains purchased this winter. We appreciate this generous community support! Our residents were also provided beautiful, thoughtful gifts from the group Santa for South Shore Seniors organized by Shannon Stewart. All 39 residents were chosen by community members and lovingly shopped for based on their individual wish lists. Gifts were delivered directly to Rosedale Home and our 2 Christmas trees were overflowing with gifts on Christmas mornina.

We have been busy these last few months: we went Christmas shopping, bowling in Bridgewater, drives looking at the beautiful Christmas lights and many meals out. At home we have been busy baking, decorating, taking exercise classes, enjoying music shows, playing trivia games and so much more. We have activities daily. 
